My friend Nicole', Pastor at Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Los Alamos, recently shared this quotation from English writer, poet and theologian G. K. Chesterton:

"Because children have abounding vitality, because they are in spirit fierce and free, therefore they want things repeated and unchanged. They always say, "Do it again"; and the grown-up person does it again until he is nearly dead. For grown-up people are not strong enough to exult in monotony. But perhaps God is strong enough to exult in monotony. It is possible that God says every morning, "Do it again" to the sun; and every evening, "Do it again" to the moon. It may not be automatic necessity that makes all daisies alike; it may be that God makes every daisy separately, but has never got tired of making them. It may be that God has the eternal appetite of infancy; for we have sinned and grown old, and our Father is younger than we."

I have been pondering this quotation for days, and what it means for us as people of faith who depend on a God who is unchanging. I love the idea of God's steadfastness being the steadfastness of the young – wonder and amazement, joy in creation, the "eternal appetite of infancy," rather than a steadfastness that is set-in-one's-ways, worn out, or resigned.

As I write this, Christmas is approaching – a celebration that is the same every year, yet holds for many of us the newness of childhood wonder and joy each year. Perhaps when Jesus says we must be like little children, he is speaking of this sense of constant wonder at life, even the most monotonous daily things – like a sunrise, the smile of a child, or a daisy. As we continue into our church year – with January's celebrations of Christ's revelation to the world in Epiphany – may we continue in this sense of wonder and openness.

Do it again, God.
Please don't ever get tired of creating and sustaining this beautiful world.
Show us again, and again, and again, your love for us.
Amen.

HELPING CHILDREN WHO ARE BLIND AND VISUALLY IMPAIRED IN OUR NEIGHBOR CITY

This article is about **Box Tops for Education**. Specifically it is about how we can help a school in our neighbor city to the west: Jefferson Elementary in Gallup. It is in one of the economically poorest counties in the U.S., yet we can be hopeful, helpful, and grateful to the people who serve the children there.



All Saints used to collect Box Tops for our preschool, but the school is not eligible to use them. That is when the Community Outreach Committee heard a proposal to pass the Box Tops on to Jenilee Charley, a teacher at Jefferson Elementary. Jenilee is of Navajo and Osage background. She also has a European ancestor who fought in the Revolutionary War. True to her wonderful spirit of inclusiveness, she celebrates all her heritages, having both tribal and DAR memberships. Her inclusivity extends to her work.

Jenilee has helped make Jefferson a magnet school for students who are blind or visually impaired. She works individually with children from ages three on up. For example, a fifth grader might start his morning in the encouraging atmosphere of Jenilee's complex of specially-equipped classrooms. He would learn to use high tech equipment to support his academic work. Visual impairment might be his sole disability, and he would spend the rest of the day in classes with sighted children. With Jenilee's help, he and others like him prepare for middle and high school and for college.

In the next part of her morning, Jenilee may work with very small children, one at a time. Some use wheelchairs that recline since it is hard for them to sit up. In another case, a little child might be secured in a standing device so that he or she could spend some time out of her chair. These children have multiple disabilities, lacking speech, complete mobility, and vision. Their conditions might be congenital, or they might be due to later illnesses or injuries. Some of these children will not move on to academic work. Jenilee so gracefully serves these little ones, helping them access what they can of the sensory world. In a darkened room, the children manipulate equipment that helps them see and control lights and fans, etc., learning cause and effect. Although these children cannot use words, they do express themselves through utterances, and Jenilee keeps up her end of the conversation, talking with them in a gentle, cheerful, and respectful way.

REFORMATION 500

As we commemorate the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, **Living Lutheran** is exploring 500 of its unique aspects, with 50 Reformation things you may not know about the Reformation.

This list is not meant as an all-encompassing compendium of everything essential to the Reformation and its theology, but rather as a glimpse of the variety of ways the movement that Luther sparked in 1517 would influence the history of the world.

31. The Council of Trent (1562) decreed that all bishops must “banish from churches all those kinds of music in which, whether by organ or in the singing, there is mixed up anything lascivious or impure, as also all secular actions; vain and therefore profane conversations, all walking about, noise, and clamor, that so the House of God may be seen to be, and may be called, truly, a house of prayer.”

32. On April 18, 1994, the Church Council of the ELCA officially repudiated and apologized for Luther’s words and teachings that have been appropriated by anti-Semites for the teaching of hatred and violence toward Judaism or toward the Jewish people. The ELCA also pledged to oppose such bigotry within the church and in society and to pray for the increasing cooperation and understanding between Lutheran Christians and the Jewish community.

33. The idea put forth during the Reformation that God sees all believers as spiritually equal had profound repercussions in the church—especially when the idea was applied to women.

34. Luther’s exhortation to read and interpret the Bible on one’s own and the impact of the printing press opened new doors for laypeople that changed the church’s approach to faith formation and Christian education forever.

35. One of the far-reaching impacts of the Reformation was the promotion of applying the word of God to every area and endeavor of life, in the church and in society.

36. The early movement of Lutheranism quickly gained followers in the German states, the Netherlands, Scandinavia, Scotland and portions of France.

37. While we associate the Reformation with Germany, broader reformation movements spread across Northern and Western Europe, including England and Switzerland.

38. England went through its own religious and political reformation in the late 1500s through early 1600s. It was influenced by Luther and other reformers, but it was more deeply intertwined with the power, personal beliefs and political motives of England’s kings, queens and political leaders of the time.

39. In the 17th century, Lutherans from Germany, Norway, Sweden, Finland, Iceland and Denmark began to migrate to the United States, bringing their language, culture and Lutheran faith with them.

40. The first Lutheran worship service in North America is believed to have taken place in what is now Manitoba, Canada, on Jan. 23, 1620.

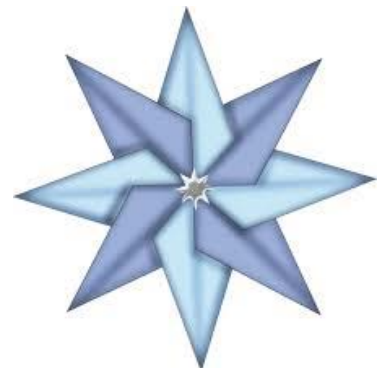
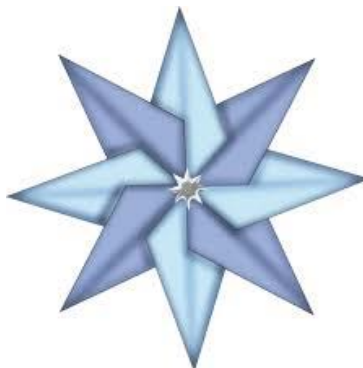
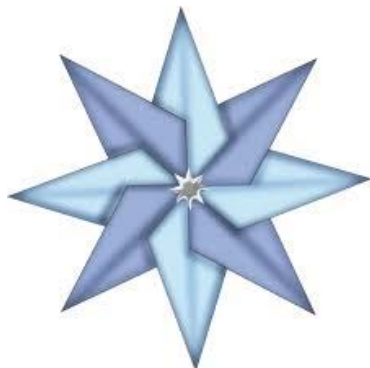
